- > Middle-East: Jordan, Egypt, Kuwait





- Identify prerequisites and success factors for capacity-building using ICT, such as the need for project sustainability, cost effectiveness, monitoring and evaluation, relevant content in local languages, local champions, social impactss, availability of human resources and an integrated approach
- Collect and disseminate testimonies and case studies from around the world on how to make a quantum leap in development by using ICT
- Assist ICT companies to show how they ensure the technology is appropriate to the development environment and their solutions to meet the needs in emerging markets



Expectations and Outcomes

- Identification and mobilization of potential partners for action in education and learning to accelerate economic and social development
- Identification of preconditions for successful capacity-building projects and policy design (including success and risk factors and indicators)
- Identification of requisite resources (technical, financial resources and expertise) and corresponding calls of interest to partners and stakeholders to contribute
- Increasing know-how among stakeholders on how to implement successful capacity-building projects utilizing ICT, through case studies and disseminating the Conference conclusions

A World Conference on the Use of IT for Capacity-Building

The conference is co-organized by Club of Rome and UNESCO on the use of information and communication technologies (ICT), including satellites, for development, in particular, capacity-building through education.

There will be a strong emphasis on learning, such as skills development programmes and the special needs of marginalized groups who are not being reached by classical education systems. Particular attention will be paid to those groups in rural and remote areas who are accessible by satellite technologies.

The World Conference covers the following themes:

Literacy and learning: status and diagnosis, response using ICT, vocational and technical training, basic education, open and distance learning through universities, overcoming marginalization

Economic development: building relevant skills for the knowledge economy, innovation for science and technology,
local entrepreneurship, ensuring multiplier effects

Cross sector capacity-building: environmental education, health education and prevention, agriculture food and markets, preservation of indigenous heritages
