

It is now clear that fighting poverty, besides being the first and most important among the Millennium Development Goals, is the most effective way to widen the markets: the gradual access to the digital revolution of the currently excluded 5 billion people is the key element for development, and we are already experiencing some of its effects.

New information and communication technologies are the primary engines of this phenomenon, as they will lead other industrial, commercial and financial entities in the globalization processes.

What a few years ago seemed a philanthropic utopia has now become a mainstream guideline, shared by decision makers and entrepreneurs who identify themselves in the Millennium Declaration and the Millennium Development Goals endorsed by the United Nations.

In order for this process to be successful it is now crucial to individuate solutions fit to the needs of the populations currently excluded, which are different from those of industrialized countries, made prosperous by a century of widespread electricity, roads, railways, centres of competence, universities, hospitals, industries and distributors.

As is not possible to create from nothing those enormous infrastructures, new strategies able to grant sustainable and rapid results are needed, alternative from those that made development possible in the XIX and XX Century in Europe and North America.

In regards to power supplies, for example, innovative forms to produce decentralized clean energy is necessary, due to the effects of global warming: the Kyoto protocol gathers the first and the third world in a united process.

It is also important that single brand production, presently fragmented and too competitive, is substituted by a more organic cooperation, to grant safe water, more efficient cultures, health and education systems able to cope with emergencies, means of communication adequate to the variety of languages and traditions, microcredit systems to activate small entrepreneurship, etc.

The coming of broadband brings forth a unique opportunity to provide directly and immediately services to communities, thus solving for the major part the health, educational, economic and productive gap of those populations, giving them new tools for development.

Individuating and applying this kind of solutions is the main aim of the Infopoverty World Conference since 2001 when, following the first ICT Villages created by OCCAM in Honduras, the Conference was created to present them to the international community, trying to activate it on this effort, which, apart from its philanthropic purposes, is mainly aimed at applying science and technology to support sustainable development.

After the positive results of the previous editions of the Conference (www.infopoverty.net) the focus of this year's edition is on exploring possible converging objectives of the first and the third world: if we want to promote global development and widen the markets, new solutions have to be

implemented in regards to energy, water, ICT tools and applications, new products and production models.

Hence, **to integrate** is the first keyword: between fragmented productions, hostile competition, proprietary standards, secret and public interests in commending positions.

**To innovate** - the second keyword - means mutating the present balances that have given birth to our unbalanced reality, trying to solve the present conflicts, calling on all the most active and competent stakeholders to elaborate common future scenarios.

**To globalise**, finally, does not mean to homologate, but to holistically widen the innovative process anywhere, creating critical masses that would make innovation and integration worthwhile.

The Conference will thus focus on 6 steps of elaboration:

- To understand new technological horizons and orient them so that they can be effective tools to fight poverty.
- To highlight social utility of ICTs in the widening of markets in order to avoid the
  exploitation of single applications favouring interest of minorities to the disadvantage of the
  potentials of new markets and to launch concrete proposals of bulk purchases of new
  technological solutions (connectivity, clan energy units, safe water kits, bed-net,medical
  devices, mobile learning, mobile banking and microcredit, etc.).
- To evaluate and implement the best practices that have had a greater impact in the development of disadvantaged communities, including the lessons learned in the ICT Villages.
- To compare different national strategies to fight poverty and international development plans to integrate them and make them efficient, avoiding squandering, duplication, obsolete models.
- To individuate modalities to provide global broadband connectivity, both terrestrial and satellite, in order to create adequate platforms for e-services (telemedicine, e-learing, egovernance, e-banking, etc) key to development.
- To create a strong polarity around the Global Alliance for ICT and Development as main instrument of integration of major stakeholders, able, thanks to its critical mass and authoritativeness, to overcome the present cultural, economic and social obstacles and to contribute to the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals.

These issues will be talked by the prestigious speakers of the Infopoverty World Conference, which is co-organised by OCCAM with the UN Global Alliance for ICT and Development Secretariat, the European Parliament Office in Milan, Politecnico di Milano and the Infopoverty Institute of the University of Oklahoma.
